### LAMBERT PARK CLOSED TO MOTORIZED VEHICLES

At the City Council meeting of January 9, 2018, the City Council voted to continue the restriction on motorized vehicles in Lambert Park except for maintenance and emergency vehicles. The roads to the Bowery and the rodeo grounds will remain open. The closure will be in effect until May 1, 2018 at which time the Council will vote on a long-term policy for Lambert Park. During the months up until May 1st, the Council will hold Public Hearings on the issue. Watch for notice of the Hearings on the Alpine City website at [www.alpinecity.org](http://www.alpinecity.org) and on the Notice Board at Alpine City Hall.

This closure will be strictly enforced by the Lone Peak Police Department. Violation of this is a class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500 as per Section 11-400 of the Alpine City Municipal Code. No shooting is allowed in Lambert Park or within Alpine City limits.

## Daughters of Utah Pioneers Dedicated to Preserving Our Heritage

The international organization known as The Daughters of Utah Pioneers (DUP) was established April 11, 1901 in Salt Lake City, UT by Annie Taylor Hyde, daughter of LDS Church President John Taylor. Hyde invited a group of fifty-four women to her home seeking to perpetuate the names and achievements of the men, women and children, the pioneers who settled the Utah Valley and surrounding areas. With successful ongoing meetings over the years, the ISDUP and its local units were incorporated in 1925.

In 1930 another dedicated DUP woman, Kate B. Carter, who had moved from Spanish Fork, UT to SLC with her husband Austin Carter, was asked to prepare lessons for DUP meetings. This assignment began a forty-year-long career as a compiler and author of pioneer histories. Her writings were published in a collection of twenty volumes Our Pioneer Heritage, a collection with twelve volumes Heart Throbs of the West and six volumes of Treasures of Pioneer History.

Carter dedicated the proceeds of her books to finance the Daughters of Utah Pioneers Museum in Salt Lake City. Today pioneer experiences from Carter's books are shared in camp meetings and serve as inspiration to DUP members to collect their own ancestral records, as well.

"There are ten camps in the Alpine/Highland area," Susan Ham reports. She is part of the Box Elder Peak Camp. Carole Jensen, a devoted member of the Deer Haven Camp, recently hosted a meeting at her home in Alpine. The event began with the Pledge of Allegiance followed by singing about Daughters of Utah Pioneers, the minutes of the previous meeting and activities, as well as the sharing of one woman's personal history experience. Additionally, there was a lesson from Carter selections, a musical rendition of an old pioneer song, and the sharing of an old artifact from the hostess's personal collection. All of this was wrapped up with lunch, a delightful experience for all to take part in! (Camp agendas may vary.)

Thank you, Daughters of Utah Pioneers, for actively continuing to keep the traditions and history of our early settlers alive. Their sacrifices and timeless efforts have truly shaped who we are today!
