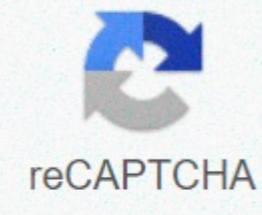

Construction began in October 1997 and was completed in 2000 at a cost of \$460 million. The stadium has a recedable roof and ground level seating can be converted from oval to rectangular configuration. The stadium was primarily used for Australian rules football and was originally built as a replacement for Waverley Park. Regional offices serve as the headquarters of the Australian Football League (AFL), which has been privately owned since October 7, 2016. [4] The stadium, with a capacity of 56,000 spectators, is Melbourne's second largest stadium and hosts several sporting events, including domestic Twenty20 cricket matches, Melbourne Victory football home matches, rugby league and rugby union matches, as well as special events and concerts. Seven Network's digital broadcasting center is also headquartered. On October 31, 1996, The History Construction Docklands Stadium, under construction in December 1998, was announced as the centre of the Australian Football League, replacing the much larger but aging Waverley Park. [5] A central but largely abandoned industrial area has just begun its own urban renewal project in Melbourne Docklands, just west of the CBD. Construction of the stadium, built by Baulderstone Hornibrook, began in October 1997 under the name Victoria Stadium[6] and was completed ahead of the 2000 AFL season. The stadium was originally developed by the Docklands Stadium Consortium and later controlled by the Seven Network, with the remaining lease on the stadium being sold to James Fielding Funds Management on June 21, 2006 for \$330 million. [7] Like Waverley Park, the stadium was built primarily for Australian rules football, unlike many similarly sized pitches in Australia designed for cricket, which were later developed for football. These first Australian rules were built throughout the history of the football stadium with a withdrawable roof that has often been closed for night matches and wet weather day matches, and sometimes for air day games. It was also the first stadium in Australia to have lively seating or moving seating, as four levels-one layers of the stadium could be moved up to 18 metres forward into a rectangular configuration; Although this is an important feature of the stadium design, it has rarely been used, due to damage to the lawn, time to distribute seats, and reduced capacity since the rectangular configuration of the corner bays of the stadium became unusable. Development Construction was completed just weeks before the first match and some pre-season matches were changed as a result. [8] The first match was played between Essendon and Port Adelaide on March 9, 2000, in front of 43,012 spectators. Essendon won the match by 94 points and Michael Long scored the first goal. [9] The game was to be played under a closed roof, but remained open due to technical problems. Six days later, Barbra Streisand gave the venue's first concert. [10] On March 19, the third football match between the Western Bulldogs and the Brisbane Lions was the first under the roof. [8] On August 16, 2000, the world's first indoor hall, One Day International, was held at the venue between Australia and South Africa. The first game played in a rectangular configuration was a Melbourne Storm game in July 2001. The interior of Docklands Stadium, whose roof was closed in 2005, has been criticised for the stadium's lack of playing surface slickness, stiffness and grass covering, and the increased risk of injury caused to players. [11] Maintaining surface quality remains one of the stadium's biggest challenges. [12] Orientation of the stadium and its highly accumulated bleachers mean that the northern end of the stadium in particular receives only 6 weeks of sunlight per year; Concerts held at the stadium are also usually placed at the Southern end due to the ability to save grass faster. [13] The entire surface, under hg Turf's contract, has been moved to a regular and expensive reserve teneb throughout the season, while the grass is paved and managed by docklands stadium management. [14] Since 2007, detailed heating and lighting have been used inside the stadium to better grow and manage the lawn. [13] The venue was damaged by the storm during the 2010 Victorian storms on the afternoon of March 6, 2010. The exterior roof of Gate 2 collapsed, causing damage and flooding within the entertainment area. The pre-season match between St Kilda and Fremantle that evening was delayed due to WorkSafe inspections, but still continued before a small crowd of 5000. The synthetic strip narrowed after Brisbane Lions player Michael Close ended an ACL injury during a game in 2015. [16] The stadium was unpopular with many tenant clubs, mostly St Kilda, North Melbourne and the Western Bulldogs, as high operating costs and a high proportion of gate revenues repaid to the stadium mean clubs earned much lower returns for a match at Docklands than they earned from the same attendance at the Melbourne Cricket Ground; And he usually had to attract at least 20,000 spectators to break even one game. [18] All three clubs received compensation payments from the AFL to balance weak deals[19] and at times sold home matches to small interstate or international venues for more financial returns than they could earn at Docklands. [20] In order to gain ownership of the STADIUM in 2025 for a nominal fee of \$30, in accordance with the terms of the agreement on the construction and operation of the venue; [21] However, the AFL Commission chose to buy exclusive ownership of the stadium in October 2016 for about \$200 million. [4] This purchase left the stadium's tenant AFL clubs millions of dollars better off, as they and the AFL arranged more positive lease agreements. [20] The stadium was integrated into the AFL structure a few years later and independent management of the hall was ended by Melbourne Stadiums Limited. [22] The acquisition was also critical to the AFL's finances during the COVID-19 pandemic, in which it was able to use ownership of the stadium to obtain a \$500-600 million loan to cover cash flow shortages when the 2020 AFL season was suspended. [23] Renewal (2021/22) In April 2018, the AFL and the Victorian Government announced that the stadium and the wider region would soon go through a \$225 million restructuring. [24] Al if the stadium's seating capacity is expected to remain unchanged, the restructuring will upgrade stadium infrastructure, connect the area to the Melbourne CBD and gain access to docklands docks. [25] Naming rights are renamed Marvel Stadium from the historic Docklands Stadium Etihad Stadium The stadium has never operated under the name 'Docklands Stadium', which has been covered by naming rights agreements throughout its entire operating history. When it opened, Colonial State Bank paid \$32,500,000 for the naming rights for 10 years, and the stadium opened as Colonial Stadium; [26] In the same year, Commonwealth Bank Colonial State Bank took over and began cutting brands; The Commonwealth then sold the balance of the naming rights contract to Telstra for about \$50 million and the stadium was renamed the Telstra Dome. 2002. During this time it was popularly called the Dome – a spoken language actively used by clubs supported by rival telecommunications companies (such as Essendon and Optus and Carlton with 3). On March 1, 2009, the naming rights were transferred to Etihad Airways[27] and became known as Etihad Stadium on a five-year deal, which was later extended to ten years at a cost of between \$5-8 million per year. [28] [29] The AFL's failure to initially recognize the new name due to an agreement with rival carrier Qantas would once again cause problems; [30] The league recognized the new name only after negotiations between the two sides. In September 2018, stadium operators changed the stadium name to Marvel Stadium after agreeing an eight-year deal with The Walt Disney Company (the parent company of Marvel Entertainment) to change name rights and set up a Marvel retail store at the venue. [31] The stadium has a pull-back roof 38 metres (125 ft) above the playing surface, opens east-west and takes eight minutes to fully open or close. [35] All Victorian-based AFL teams, including those not listed here, have played at least 46 AFL matches a year between the AFL and the stadium's original owners until 2013, and then some home matches throughout its history, provided it organizes 40 matches a year. Geelong and Collingwood both had opportunities to play about four home games a year during the 2000s; [8] and most other clubs still play one or two home matches a year to compensate for the numbers. Cricket The venue's largest summer tenant Big Bash League side, the Melbourne Renegades, have played their home games at Docklands Stadium since the league was founded in 2011/12. A pop-up pitch is used to facilitate cricket in the venue. At the end of the 2016/17 Big Bash, the stadium was considered the most entertaining venue for T20 cricket in Australia. [36] Football A-League side Melbourne Victory also play home matches at Docklands. Initially, the plan was that the stadium would only be used for games against its biggest rivals, Sydney FC, the 2006/07 A-League; However, after the success of this match, the club moved permanently from Olympic Park Stadium to Docklands from the 2006/07 season to the 2009/10 season. This stadium gave its first big summer tenant. Since the opening of Melbourne Rectangular Stadium in 2010, the club now plays only high drawing games and finals in docklands, all other games are played in the new stadium. During the rugby league

2001 National Rugby League season, the stadium was the permanent home ground for the Melbourne Storm, but that deal lasted only a year. The club then hosted high draws and finals at Docklands from time to time. Docklands has also hosted interstate and international rugby league matches. As the Telstra Dome, Docklands hosted its first State of Origin game in 2006. New South Wales were looking for a win that ensured their fourth Origin victory in a row and were 14-4 up with 10 minutes remaining, but Queensland scored two converted tries in five minutes - first Brent Tate's long-range try after a line break from Johnathan Thurston and then Darren Lockyer stopping a Brett Hodgson pass in New South Wales' own half - winning 16-14 in the first of 8 Queensland victories in a row.
