The presiding Serbian member of the three-member Bosnian presidency, Milorad Dodik, donated the gilded icon to Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov when he visited Bosnia on December 14. Dozens of Serbs have fought alongside pro-Russian rebels in the conflict. The Ukrainian Embassy in Sarajevo has information on how the Bosnian Bosnian Leader came to own the icon, noting that the failure to provide the information would mean Bosnia supports Russia's aggressive policies and military actions in eastern Ukraine.Russia's Foreign Ministry said on Saturday it would return the icon to the Bosnian Serbs for an international police investigation into its origin. After more than a week of silence, Dodik's office said in a statement that the icon was not stolen and that it was not a piece of cultural heritage or national treasure. It is an icon blessed by the Church that ordinary Orthodox believers keep in their homes. The statement did not say how Dodik came to own the religious artwork or how it was brought to Bosnia. Instead, it condemned rival Bosnian politicians and media for spreading lies aimed at damaging Serbian-Russian relations. Distinguishing lies cannot harm fraternal relations between the two Orthodox nations, the statement said. Hoti said he fully respects the court's ruling and his cabinet would be the incumbent government until a new one is installed. Arifi was sentenced to 15 months in prison in August 2019 for illegally using €26,000 in public funds made available to a non-governmental organization for personal gain. Nevertheless, he ran for the new parliament in October of the same year and was automatically elected to parliament as the leader of a minority Roma party. Arifi surrendered to the police in September and is now serving his sentence. Existing home sales fell by 2.5% seasonally adjusted to 5.98 million units between October and November. This is the first decline in this number since May, when real estate market activity began to recover from the closures in March and April due to the coronavirus closures. After the lockdowns were lifted, the housing market picked up speed, fueled by record-low mortgage rates that contributed to home affordability. Thousands of families affected by home stays were looking for homes better adapted to work at home. Suburbs were among the biggest beneficiaries. Before the decline, existing home sales were at their lowest level in 15 years. Sales of existing properties were still up 25.6 percent in the month, the industry association said. The median sale price of a house in November was \$315,500, 15.1% more than year earlier, on a non-seasonally adjusted basis. The average duration of time a house is on the market remained at 21 days, the same as in October. That time has fallen from 38 days a year earlier, a sign that supply problems continue to affect both home prices and sales. Jorge Felipe, the president of the Rio City Council, will take office, while Crivella will be jailed. Deputy Mayor Fernando MacDowell died of a heart attack in 2018. Mayor-elect Paes went on Twitter that he was in contact with Felipe and asked him to mobilize city workers and ensure a smooth transition. Health experts welcomed the step-by-step approach at the time, but expressed fears that it would be implemented too soon. Ms Buck said at the time that there was an opportunity to restore the integrity of the council and to stand out from where it was. It was just a matter of someone who knew the difference between how they worked and how they worked. Ms. Buck told The Auroran in 2014. My main goal was to bring some courtesy back to our Council Chamber by being the kind of person I am. The mayor of Temiskaming Shores, Carman Kidd, told the council at its regular meeting on December 15 that he had received a letter in the morning from the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNR). John Yakubuski, that the company had been approved, which he said had been a struggle for the past seven years. We've had ups and downs for the last seven years. We didn't even know from October whether it would fall apart or not. Kidd told the council. This proposal has gone through and everyone has signed letters of support from all the political groups, and the ministry has now opted out. The Temagami Advisory Team sent the proposal to The MNR, which wanted to establish Ontario's second local forest management company, which manages the Temagami Forest Unit and markets and sells the unit's crown forest resources. The advisory team consists of local citizens representing Temagami First Nation, Teme-Augama Anishnabai, Matachewan First Nation, Temiskaming First Nation, Temiskaming First Nation, Temiskaming Shores, Temagami Municipality, Latchford City, Latchford City, James Township, Georgia Pacific, EACOM, Goulard Lumber and Alex Welch Logging. Local forest management societies bring together local and indigenous communities and industry to promote sustainable harvesting and management of local forests. Companies have sustainable forest licences and market, sell and provide access to a predictable and competitive supply of crown forest resources. They also offer employment and economic development opportunities. That's quite a deal that we've actually worked out, Kidd said. The four indigenous communities have also been on the side, they involved in this whole process, as well as the three to four major industries EACOM, Georgia-Pacific and Goulard Lumber and some of our local smaller mills - South Wabi Sawmill. This will keep these industries going for the next 15 to 20 years. Kidd feels that the company will allow the locals and the people of Temagami to develop other value-added industries. That's something first nations really look at, he noted. They have been cut out of the whole process for many years, with some of the large companies removing the entire supply of wood, but this will enable them to actually develop their own businesses and also market some of that wood. Temagami Mayor Dan O'Mara commented in an email to The Speaker that with the company's recent provincial approval, work will be needed to get the new organization going. Over the last seven years, a lot of work has been put into it by a number of people, and we will take a new approach to the management of the local Temagami Forest. The local authority is headed by a board of directors appointed by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario as part of an established public appointment process. The Board of Directors will monitor the work of the Company, including the selection of the Managing Director, the development of the strategic plan, the monitoring of the Agency's reporting obligations and the overall management of the forest. The Temagami Advisory Team has recommended to the Board that it have six reserved seats, consisting of two for the local First Nations (one specifically for Temagami First Nation), two for municipalities (one specifically for the municipality of Temagami) and two for the forestry industry. The first municipal council to be nominated to the Board of Directors, subject to confirmation by the Secretariat for the Province's appointments, are Jeff Barton for Latchford, Elk Lake and Temiskaming Shores and John Kenrick for Temagami. The company is expected to be set up at the end of 2020 or early 2021 and could take about 12-18 months. It is also hoped that the new company will operate under a Sustainable Forest Licence until 1 April 2022. On Monday, the province announced closures across Ontario, including in most school districts. In Hamilton, primary schools will remain closed until 11 January 2021, while secondary schools will remain closed until 25 January 2021. In the meantime, all students will be enrolled in Remote Learning. Asking students and staff to stay at home a little longer will help us do what we need to control the spread. These are decisions that are extremely difficult but critical, Premier Doug Ford said on Monday. During this time, childcare facilities, authorized leisure and qualification programs, and home childcare facilities will remain open, the province said. From 4 to 8 January, school programmes will be closed before and after school, but emergency childcare will be offered to health and frontworkers. The province said the councils will be required to make exceptions for support for students with special educational needs where possible. While our schools are not a source of increasing community transfers, we can play an important part of the solution to saving lives from COVID-19, Education Minister Stephen Lecce said. During this time, students will switch to teacher-led online learning, with childcare offered to our staff at the forefront. We are taking proactive and preventive measures to protect schools after the holidays to ensure that children can continue to learn in the classroom, which we believe to be so important for the rest of the year. Although the holiday break has begun, the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board is making an effort to now that the students are equipped with remote learning technology for January 4. Chief executive Dawn Danko told Spec that some staff were recalled to schools to check their inventory and distribute equipment to needy families. After implementation Survey in November, the chamber found that at least 6,000 students need a computer or iPad in the event of school closures. One can imagine that this would be much easier if we were still in school, Danko said. But since the schools closed, staff have been withdrawn and are working on a way to pass these devices on to families. Danko said the board will release more information in the coming days on how families can pick up devices for their children before school begins. The board is also waiting for equipment deliveries, Danko said, and does not yet have the number of devices needed to support each student. We have to do our best to get devices into the hands of every student, and we're about to have that number, she told The Spec on Monday. In a post on its website, the HWDSB stated that it would continue to allow students with special needs to learn in person. As part of Ontario's efforts to protect the most vulnerable, the HWDSB will continue to provide continuous support for students with special educational needs who cannot be accommodated through distance learning, which is a challenge for remote learning, the board wrote. Four weeks later, the brakes are pulled even harder in this critical phase of the second wave – a phase in which hospitalizations continue to rise. Premier Doug Ford's government will impose sweeping measures on Boxing Day as part of a provincial shutdown. From December 26, decommissioning in the northern regions of the province will last two weeks and four weeks for southern Ontario until January 23. Premier Ford announced the latest measures at a press conference on Monday afternoon, flanked by his chief of staff, health and education ministers and president of the William Osler Health System, which operates Brampton's hard-hit civic hospital. The new restrictions provide for distance learning for primary school pupils until 11 January and secondary school pupils until 25 January. Secondary schools with on-site teaching components will be limited to 10 people per class, with some exceptions available for health and medical training providers. By the time the closure takes place in four days, Dr. Lawrence Loh, Peel's Medical Officer of Health, said residents will be encouraged to stay home, except for important trips. I would encourage them to live their lives as if we are already in the midst of trying to limit our contacts and interactions. Ultimately, the message is still the same, Loh said in an interview. The Prime Minister said the decision to delay the shutdown would continue until after gives companies the opportunity to prepare in areas that he is not currently blocked. Earlier in the day, a provincial briefing for COVID-19 modeling made the case for closure as early as possible. If we start on December 21 instead of December 28, this will see a significant reduction in cases in almost every scenario, said Dr. Adalstein Brown, dean of the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto. For example, if the province had zero percent growth and began shutting down on December 21, it would reduce the total number of

cases by 800 by the end of this month, with a reduction of more than 11,000 cases by the end of January, said Brown, who is also co-chair of the provincial government's science advisory group. On Monday, Peel accounted for 480 of the 2,123 new infections in Ontario, according to Toronto. It was the seventh day in a row that Ontario surpassed 2,000 cases. The last two weeks of epidemiological reports in Peel show that brampton has fallen from 9.9 percent to 8.7 percent, with a current incidence rate of 186.6 cases per 100,000 inhabitants compared to 203.4. Brampton still has the highest incidence rate with 262.3 cases per 100,000, followed by Mississauga with 139 and Caledon with 130. These numbers are a far cry from spring. Between May 11 and 24, Peel's incidence rate was 59 cases per 100,000 inhabitants. A few months later, in July, the availability of acute hospital beds and intensive care units remained in the green, with a positivity rate of 1.6 across the region – well below Ontario's 3 percent hurdle. In the first week of October, this moved just above the provincial threshold, suggesting whether or not the viral spread is under control, and Brampton's local positivity rate continued to rise to 9.6 percent and fluctuated in double digits as the second wave swelled. Although the rollout of national vaccines is underway and hospitals in trillium and William Osler are among the next 17 to receive Pfizer BioNTech doses, hospitals continue to struggle with an increase in COVID-19 patients. Mississauga has seen an 82 per cent increase in COVID-19 stays since November. On December 21, Trillium had 89 COVID-19 patients in hospital, 27 of whom were in critical care. On December 21, Osler treated 96 patients for COVID-19, 17 of whom were in critical care. In the province, the occupancy of the intensive care unit over the next 10 days is more than 300 beds, with the worst-case forecasts showing an occupancy of more than 1,500 beds by mid-January, according to provincial data. Based on the results in Like France and Australia, the modelling of tough lockouts of four to six weeks shows that Ontario could reduce the number of cases to less than 1,000 per day. Under the new restrictions, occupancy limits of 50 percent capacity will apply to companies that and discount and big-box retailers, who also sell groceries, are supposed to limit shoppers to 25 percent capacity. Outdoor events are limited to 10 people and indoor events are not allowed, except with members of the same household. Weddings, funerals and religious events that can accommodate physical distancing are also limited to 10 people, indoors and outdoors. I support Premier Ford's decision to close down the country nationwide. While I and many others in Mississauga hoped that we would be removed from the lockdown by the new year, unfortunately this is not the case, Mississauga Mayor Bonnie Crombie said in a statement on Monday. Last Wednesday, it called on the province to shut down the entire GTHA after cellphone location data showed that region hopping had become more common since Peel and Toronto were singled out by the province in November when they closed off the rest of Ontario. The province's phone data shared with Peel showed that Brampton, with the highest number of residents who entered the United States in the past week, was second only to Windsor, Dr. Loh said. But he was quick to contextualize the data. He attributed the figures to the city's prominent trucking and distribution sector. The one thing missing from the provincial announcement... is the support of our essential workers, worker protection, paid sick days. We know that these are some of the big pieces that are also driving the transition to our community. He added that anecdotal, health workers know that residents are organizing buses from gray barrier zones and into areas with fewer restrictions. York was closed about two weeks ago to stem the movement between regions and counter rising local infection rates, but Halton remains in the red-control level of the province's framework. The province is also introducing a grant for small businesses of between 10,000 and 20,000 U.S. dollars for entrepreneurs who will see a 20 percent drop in sales between April 2019 and April 2020 and have to close stores or restrict services as a result of the closure.
