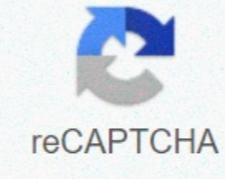

U.S. Navy Commander-in-Chief Vice Admiral John B. Nowell Jr. May 24, 2019 Official Website Chief of Naval Personnel (CNP) is responsible for general manpower prepared for the United States Navy. The CNP is therefore the highest-ranking human resources officer in the Navy. CNP also served as Vice President of Naval Operations (Manpower, Personnel, Training and Training) and is one of five Assistant Chief of Operations with the identification of N1/NT. [1] CNP oversees operations of the Naval Personnel Bureau (BUPERS), Naval Personnel Command (NPC) and the Naval Force Manpower Analysis Center (NAVMAC). [2] The CNP and four other DCNAs are nominated by the President of the United States and must be approved by the Senate by a majority of votes. CNP and DCNOs are appointed as three-star vice admirals in the off-duty. The role of Chief of Staff of the Navy and Vice President of Naval Operations (Manpower, Personnel, Training and Training) goes hand in hand. DCNO implements all strategy and resource policies and serves as a single resource sponsor in all manpower and training program issues. DCNO also performs all tasks related to Capitol Hill, including all congressional statements on issues related to Manpower, Personnel, Education, & Training. The DCNO office also acts as a lead organization for interface with Department of Defense (DOD) and Navy Department (DON) officials, other U.S. military and foreign departments, other Navy commands, other Federal agencies and private organizations. [3] The Chiefs list Navigation Bureau assumed responsibilities for personnel management of the United States Navy until 1942, when the Navy Personnel Bureau was established.
