Microsoft has put an end to one of its favorite free software packages, Windows Essentials. It contained many programs, including a blogging program, the now de-existing MSN Messenger, Windows Live Mail, and Movie Maker. The latter was a particularly beloved program, because it facilitated the implementation of basic changes in the film. With Movie Maker, you can add an introductory screen, credits, soundtrack, cut out some portions of a video, add visual filters, and then share those videos on platforms like Facebook, YouTube, Vimeo, and Flickr. This free, open-ended program has a basic interface at the top of the window with various features, including timeline view and filters such as fading and removing audio and video. Like other video editing programs, you can set start and end points on the timer in the main work window. This program is not as easy to use or understandable as Movie Maker. Nevertheless, with a little time, you can learn things. If you want to add a filter, for example, select select and then in the sidebar that appears, select the plus button. Versions of Movie Maker were available to Users of Windows 7, Vista, and XP. Most computers meet the minimum operational requirements for Movie Maker, but those who do a lot of editing needed a good computer for video editing. Movie Maker supports most video formats, whether you were working with full HD or a compressed Flash movie or mobile phone. If Movie Maker does not support the video format, users can easily use the downloadable video compression software to convert it to .avi, which was the preferred Movie Maker format. APO equalizer with room interface - free If you want convenience, convenience, interface and easy configuration, I would still suggest FxSound Enhancer in advance. If you don't mind getting your technical hands a little dirty, the APO Equalizer is a better option and is free and open source. Setup takes some time and you need to read the support files carefully. Install the APO equalizer and then download the room interface. These two combined provide powerful sound control software along with a feature-based interface. With the room interface, you get extreme control over creating your own presets. EarTrumpet - Free EarTrumpet has been recognized as one of the best sound control apps in Windows 10. Instead of adding an bulky new interface to go through, EarTrumpet essentially expands to the existing Windows 10 audio mixer interface. With EarTrumpet, you can control the individual volume of each open program and quickly switch playback devices. You can also configure default audio devices for specific programs. What I like most about EarTrumpet is that it integrates nicely with Windows 10 - it looks more like an official audio mixer update than a standalone app. What's great about EarTrumpet is that it's also free. You can find it in the Microsoft Store. Voicemeeter – Free VoiceMeeter is a huge step up from EarTrumpet, but the additional features are really only useful for those who need to tune individual audio streams. With VoiceMeeter, you can change the equalizer of multiple audio devices at the same time and adjust where the sound is directed. For example, you can record desktop, but not your voice or vice versa. If you're streaming to platforms like Twitch or YouTube, you can do so so that your in-game audio and voice are received, but your friends' voice in the communication app isn't. Voicemeeter offers many possibilities, although this requires heavy reading or watch tutorial to learn how to master it. Voicemeeter software can be found for free with VB-Audio.
