If someone pretends to be one of the best, it's the health researchers at King's. Over the past century, college graduates have won 12 Nobel Prizes for their work, including the development of beta-blockers, yellow fever vaccines and DNA mapping. Just last week, staff at a school threatened were in all the newspapers for discovering a blood test that made it easier to detect Alzheimer's disease. Why do King's bosses want to smash this? It's not about the financial Last year, credit rating agency SPC warned managers that the pressure to maintain academic and non-academic service standards will affect the ability to further reduce costs. Partly it is the case that a college that already has one of the UK's most valuable property portfolios can continue to buy buildings - as if real estate was at the heart of an academic ideal. But it also reflects a big trend in our universities, which are increasingly suffering from table viewing and group thinking. In his plans, King's managers are making the most of their hopes of being just below Imperial and Oxbridge. Asked what league table they were looking at, senior management said: As a single indicator of the league table rankings, we use income or research revenue. In other words: forget about academic quality - feel my tutu. This Japanese professor was right: pushed into the market, higher education managers don't really know how to act. So they ape each other, pass on what they do to what is left of the staff as new wisdom - and pay themselves huge sums for the destruction of one of the few sectors in which Britain leads the world.
