As part of Citizen Lab's research on security and privacy applications, we reported on issues we discovered in three COVID-related applications in Indonesia and the Philippines - PeduliLindungi, StaySafe PH and COVID-KAYA. On December 20, 2020, government employees used NSO Group's Pegasus spyware to hack 36 personal phones belonging to journalists, manufacturers, anchors and executives of Al Jazeera. The journalists were hacked by four Pegasus operators, including one operator MONARCHY, whom we attribute to Saudi Arabia, and one operator who is the insidious of the lastrel, which we attribute to the United Arab Emirates. December 8, 2020 Transparency and accountability for Canada's 5G problems will not be found in a policy that primarily concerns a single company. Instead, a strong and seller-neutral approach is needed. December 1, 2020 Circles is a monitoring company that reportedly exploits vulnerabilities in the global mobile phone system to snoop on calls, texts and location phones around the world, and is affiliated with the NSO Group, which develops off-abused Pegasus spyware. Using internet scanning, we found a unique signature related to the host names of checkpoint firewalls used in communication deployments, allowing us to identify circuit deployments in at least 25 countries. Citizen Lab is an interdisciplinary laboratory located in the Munk School of Global Affairs & Public Policy, University of Toronto, focusing on research and development at the intersection of information and communication technologies, human rights and global security. Additional information. All records and emails from Freedom of Information requests are submitted to various federal and provincial departments, and municipal police services in Canada. On 7 December 2020, Citizen Lab published a report examining Huawei, 5G technologies and Canadian telecommunications issues. Based exclusively on open source reporting, it considers that Canada does not in itself have a Huawei problem; it has a 5G strategy problem with the Canadian Government, which does not have a fundamental set of integrated industrial, cyber security and foreign policy strategies. This document summarises the findings of the investigation and the questions and answers of the Group. This report shall include a summary of the results of the SCCO scan study and shall proceed as follows: firstly, the work of the laboratory in the field of gender and digital security; secondly, it maps the research and advocacy landscape in this area and discusses the results of interviews, and finally highlights some of the research gaps that are important for Citizen Lab's work. Introduction to Global Citizenship View below citizen at Humber View below Citizen World View Below Global Studies Course View Below (1) GBLC 001:Introduction to Global Citizenship This course introduces the concept of global citizenship, including relevant knowledge, skills, values and active citizenship. Learners think about citizenship rights and responsibilities at local, national and global level in communities and explore the historical and modern context that shapes what it means to be academic discipline. Learners will design an e-portfolio to deliberately map and document their learning experiences and results in a certificate. Approximate time to complete (at your own pace): 30 hours. (2) GBLC 002: Humber Citizen This course introduces community concepts, including locality, membership, unity/cohesion, authority, scope and boundaries. Learners examine the basic principles and foundations of community engagement and development, as well as barriers to participation and analyse their role as members of different communities. Humber College's Global Citizenship Certificate is an interdisciplinary, four-course online program that helps prepare you for dealing with living in our culturally diverse and rapidly changing world. Through a combination courses, travel experiences, and extracurricular activities that suit your current studies, get a highly valued global perspective, deepen your understanding of human diversity, your connection and cultural complexity, and increase your sense of personal and community responsibility. 2. Are there preconditions or co-terms? Students must complete one academic credit with an international attribute offered by one of the Humber's Academic Schools. The courses with this attribute have learning outcomes that contribute to the development of global competence. The aim is to guide learners to think critically about global challenges in their career-oriented professional and personal interests. This Global Studies Course can be either a core or elective within your chosen field of study. At the discretion of the Humber Committee on Internationalisation, there is prior/co-required approval. The Global Citizenship Certificate is open to all currently registered Humber students with a diploma, advanced diploma, postgraduate certificate or postgraduate program. In each individual case, non-thyme learners in the Humber may be authorised to register with the GCC as part of a special professional development initiative coordinated by the institution. 4. How is a global citizenship certificate issued? The study takes place online on a whiteboard (i.e. GBLC 001-003), in the classroom (i.e. a global study course before/co-director, pre-departure and post-departure orientation students) and in different community environments. Learners communicate and share resources with each other on platforms and academic schools and are encouraged to use creative methods to demonstrate their learning outcomes (e.g. reflective writing, blogging, film, photography, animation, poetry, drawing, etc.). 5. Does this count towards my degree or diploma program? After successfully passing the World Citizenship Certificate, you will receive a certificate of completion on your official academic transcript. Can I customize the program to suit my area of interest? Absolutely! Learners can adapt the elements of the certificate to their specific interests by selecting topics, community engagement and learning experiences abroad that correspond to their academic and/or personal interests. 7. I am currently involved on campus. Can I apply this experience to the requirement of a 40-hour engagement experience? Yes, you'll receive the program with the approval of the administrator. It is important that that students demonstrate that their experiences offer new opportunities to develop or improve specific skills in order to gain new knowledge in line with the learning outcomes of the testimony. The aim of this requirement is to actively engage students in experiences that challenge them to explain and broaden their understanding of relationships with different communities and cultures; develop, hone and strengthen the necessary skills for adaptation, cooperation and management; and to combine and expand their knowledge in order to gain a deeper and critical understanding of political, social, environmental and economic issues. 8. I am not currently involved on campus, but I was previously involved in activities prior to the GCC launch. Can I apply this experience to the requirement of 40 hours of community engagement? No, you can't. An important part of the experience of participation is to deal with the deliberate reflection of skills development and acquired learning. This cannot be achieved retrospectively. 9. What is the fee for each GCC course? There is no fee to enroll in each GCC courses.
