On iPhone X and later, or an iPad with Face ID, go to Settings > Face ID & Passcode. On previous iPhone models, go to Touch ID & Passcode. On a device without Touch ID, go to Settings > Passcode. Tap Turn on Passcode. Enter a six-digit passcode. Or tap Passcode Options to switch to a four-digit numeric code, custom numeric code, or custom alphanumeric code. Enter your passcode again to confirm it and turn it on. On iPhone X and later, or an iPad with Face ID, go to Settings > Face ID & Passcode. On older iPhone models, go to Settings > Touch ID & Passcode. On a device without Touch ID, go to Settings > Passcode. You'll find some settings and options: Turn off Passcode: Tap this option to turn off your passcode. Change Passcode: Enter a new six-digit passcode. Or tap Passcode Options to switch to a four-digit numeric code, custom numeric code, or custom alphanumeric code. Require Passcode: As soon as you lock the screen, the default for this setting will ask you to enter your passcode to unlock. If you don't want passcode requirements right away, change these settings. (For your own security, if you use Touch ID or Apple Pay, you can't change your passcode requirements right away). Allow Access When Locked: Use this option to allow access to some features when your device is locked, including Today View, Notification Center, Siri, Reply with messages, Control Center, Wallet, and USB accessories. Clear Data: Choose whether to automatically erase your device after ten failed passcode attempts. If you don't enable this option, your device needs to be restored on your computer after ten failed attempts. Follow the steps in this section for help with things like passcode settings, alerts, and forgotten passwords. Configuration profiles and email accounts based on Microsoft Exchange (common with business or educational devices) sometimes have passcode policies that cause problems like this: You can't disable your passcode. You can't change passcode settings because they're unavailable, grayed out, or dimmed. You'll see a notice about passcode requirements. For example, you might message that says you must change your iPhone unlock passcode within 60 minutes. Contact your IT administrator for assistance. If you're not using a configuration profile or Microsoft Exchange account, or if your device is privately owned, make sure you update your device to the latest version of iOS or iPadOS. Thank you for your feedback. You can set up a screen lock to help you your Android phone or tablet. Each time you turn on your device or wake the screen, you'll be asked to unlock the device, usually with a PIN, pattern, or password. On some devices, you can unlock it with your fingerprint. Set or change your Important screen lock: To make sure your automatic and manual backups are encrypted with your screen lock, use a PIN, pattern, or password. Learn how to back up or restore data on your phone. Open your phone's Settings app. Tap Security. To choose a kind of screen lock, tap Screen lock. If you've already set up a key, you'll need to enter a PIN, pattern, or password before you can select a different key. Tap the screen lock option you want to use. Follow the on-screen instructions. Your screen lock option may find different options depending on your phone. For more information about screen lock for your device, go to the manufacturer's support site. No Key None: Your phone remains unlocked. This doesn't provide protection, but you can get into the Home screen quickly. Swipe: Swipe your finger across your screen. This doesn't provide protection, but you can get into the Home screen quickly. Standard key pattern: Draw a simple pattern with your finger. PIN: Enter 4 or more numbers. Longer PINs tend to be more secure. Password: Enter 4 letters or numbers or more. A strong password is the most secure screen lock option. Options:
