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Walking by faith bible study pdf

We are investigating the principles of Paul's letter to the Romans in this series of articles. The first three principles are: 1) Seeking God; 2) Extend your understanding of yourself as falling short of the glory of God; 3) Extend your understanding of your personal relationship with God. Paul says: So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing through the word of God (Rom. 10:17). So walking by faith is to walk according to the word of God. Whoever goes according to holiness has indeed believed in God, and none has done wrong. Faith is a noun that indicates a state of trust and confidence that has arrived through persuasness. Trust is a form of verb faith which means to be persuaded and therefore to place trust in what is believed. The definition here is fairly easy to understand, but the difficulty for some people comes in reconciling the different Scriptures regarding faith. For example, Paul says: But for him who does not work but believes in Him who justifies the ungodly, his faith is accounted for righteousness (Rom. 4:5). And, James said: But do you want to know, O fool, that faith without works is dead (Jas. 2:20). Paul and James appear diametrically opposed to some men who suggest that James' letter should be removed from the Bible. But a close examination of the texts reveals that Paul and James taught the exact same thing in different ways. In Romans Paul used the word work to represent the works of the law (Rom. 2: 3:19-20, 27-31; 4:13-16) Whereas, James used the word work to represent the work of obedient faith (2:1, 14 ff). Although men have embraced relationships of faith and work, Paul succinctly states their relationships. To the People of The Book, they say, You have been saved, because you used to say, God has given us the day, and you have no power over you. For we are His works, strengthened in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them (Eph. 2:8-10). And to the Colosians Paul said: In Him you are also circumcised by circumcision made without hands, by delaying the body of the sins of the flesh, by the circumcision of Christ, buried with Him in baptism, where you were also raised with Him faith in the work of God, who raised Him from the dead (Colonel 2:11-12). Jesus also taught us the relationship between faith and work. He will say, Will you look down? Jesus answered and said to them, This is God's work, that you believe in Him who He sends.' Those who believe in God obey God and therefore do God's works. Those who do not believe in God and disobey Him will not be smitflled, but this does not eliminate the fact that we are saved by faith through grace. In Roman, Paul was unequivocally by the fact that salvation by grace by faith does not give One license to disobey (sin) to God (Rom. 6:1 ff, 15 ff; 8:1 ff, 12:1 ff). Therefore, Paul concluded: So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing through the word of God. Paul said: By faith of Abraham, when he was tested, offered Isaac, and he who had received the promises offered to his only son, among whom it was said, 'In Isaac your seed will be called,' taking into account that God could raise him, even from the dead . . . (Heb. 11:17-19). Abraham did not understand how God could keep his promise if he killed his son, but He believed God was capable of doing whatever He said – even if it meant that God had to raise Isaac from the dead. Therefore, Abraham obeyed God and offered his son. Walking with faith is fully convinced that God is capable of doing whatever He promises – not wavng at God's promises (Rom. 4:20-21). Those who walk upon their faith obey God. How many times do you need an answer from God so you try to walk by faith? I am talking about words directly from God that will help you in your current situation. Although we all know that God is immortal and does not operate by our time constraints, we can be sure that He moves and acts on our behalf when we stand in faith in His Word. We are reminded in 2 Corinthians 5:7 that we walk by faith and not by sight. But wait, what exactly does walking with faith look like? Mere phrases indicate movement activity. Walking by faith means that you begin the journey. Along this journey, you have to do more than just believe. You must pay attention to your thoughts, your words, and the actions you take – these are fundamental steps to walk by faith in God. Here's why: 1. Keep Your Mind. The mind is a spiritual seed. They are the starting point of what finally manifests in your life. Your mind determines how you react to the situation and how you bring yourself into the world. The things you think about also affect how you feel. In Philippians 4:8, God clearly gives us His standard of what we should think. This is your key to running in victory. Often when we are dealing with difficult situations, we are bombarded by negative thoughts, these include excruciating worries, doubts, and even fears. Our greatest battles are most often fought in our minds. Unless you keep your mind, you will continue to run in defeat. The Word of God says in Proverbs 4:23 that we must take care of our minds. Isaiah 26:3 gives us the guarantee of perfect peace when our minds remain with Him. To walk by faith, you must be aware of what you think. You don't just have to be aware of the You must also make sure that your mind is lined up to God's standards. 2. Take care of your mouth. What did you say? It's easy to say I believe in God and I wait for Him, but while you wait, what do you say? Are you talking faith about the situation or are you voting for doubt and fear? Stop for a minute and think about how you described your dilemma in your last conversation. Are you saying I don't know how this is going to work, or things look so bad, I don't know what I'm going to do? Your words should show your belief that God works on your behalf. Matthew 12:37 shares that with your words you will be justified or condemned. The words you say out of your mouth will benefit you, or they will work against you. It's up to you to decide. To walk by faith, you must also speak confidently and courageously as if the situation has been resolved positively in your favor. You have to speak in faith as it's already done! 3. What Are You Doing? God's Word tells us that faith without work is dead. This means that we cannot simply pray and then delegate our work to the Lord. He will not abdicate from His throne and do what He gives YOU the strength and ability to do. If you pray for a new home, do you start the home search process? Are you starting to save money on down payments? Are you researching the market for a home that fits your budget? Do you HAVE a budget? If you believe in a more desirable job, have you updated your resume? Are you looking for additional training to improve your skills? Walking by faith means taking action. Walking requires setting up an on-site plan and doing the necessary work. So, what's the play call? So that we continue our journey with this faith, let us be word players, not just listeners. (James 1:22) So you begin to take steps of faith, encouraged to know that God will meet you on the road to your victory! Walking by faith is something that at one time or another we all struggle with. We can be inspired by a great sermon or someone gives us a word of encouragement, but as soon as the emotion of the event is confronted, we are faced with whether we will walk by faith or not and not by sight, or we will look around and say it is definitely not God after all. This morning, I wanted to cheer you up. Not because you somehow missed it or failed your Christian life, but I want to overcome it. I want to encourage you to walk by faith and not by sight every day, so let's look at the passage in the Bible that speaks of walking by faith and not by sight.2 CORINTHIANS 5:7FOR WE WALK BY FAITH, NOT BY SIGHT. This verse is part of the dialogue Paul had with the Corinthian church about what happens to people when they die. He told them that when people leave their bodies, they are present with the Lord. And they cannot look at themselves with their senses, they walk by faith knowing that this is true regardless of what they see with their physical senses. The reason that Paul uses this phrase is that it is a principle that includes about how we live all our Christian lives and is not exclusively used to just believe in heaven. Jesus who is the author and finisher of our faith, (Heb. 12:2) gives us an example of walking by faith when He sees beyond the cross and shame He will endure and sets His gaze on the joy that will occur when He redeems mankind. HEBREWS 12:2 We do this by watching Jesus, the champion who began and perfected our faith. [a] Because joy[b] awaited him, he bore the cross, ignoring his shame. Now he sits in the place of honor next to the throne of God. How do we walk by faith? To understand how we walk by faith we must first understand where faith comes from. There is a passage in the Roman language that is used many times to explain where faith comes from. ROMANS 10:17So faith comes from hearing, that is, hearing the Good News of Christ.Now, most people, when they read the passage, assume that Paul is speaking of the scriptures. However, the assumption comes from a culture that does not yet know or experience life without the invention of printing. Printing was discovered in 1450 AD, and incidentally, the first thing printed was the Bible. Before printing, the Bible was hand copied so rarely. So if faith comes from reading the Bible, then the majority of Christians are excluded from being able to have faith come to them. I believe that Paul spoke of Jesus in this passage. Jesus is referred to as the word of God in John 1:11-14, 1 John 5:7, 1 Peter 1:23, Hebrews 4:12.So faith comes through hearing. Hear what? I believe it hears god's voice on certain issues. The council came by Jesus. Jesus said that His sheep would hear His voice. So faith comes when we hear, and hearing comes when Jesus speaks. And you will surely know. The Process Of Walking With FaithTake the first stepSo now that we know how faith comes, how do we walk in faith? It starts with taking action! It sounds simple because none of us remember learning how to walk. We've seen our kids learn how to walk though. There were a lot of mistakes, a lot of falls, and a lot of themselves. The same thing happened to us. We lose things, we fall, and we get ahead of God. However, in the end, we learn how to walk, and the way we start it is by taking that first step. Words can't be in my vocabulary. My father used to say he could never do anything. He's right. If you're going to learn how to walk with faith you're going to have to lose the idea that that Can't do anything. You can, as long as God has guided you to do so. So if you have heard the voice of Jesus say something, get rid of the word can not. Be honest, if you choose not to walk, it doesn't mean you can't it is that you won't. The journey to your destinationSantu is important that we know where we are going when we walk by faith. Just as Paul reminded the Corinthian church of their eternal purpose, we also need to stay focused on the bigger picture of where we are going. Over the years the Lord has given me a vision of a city on a hill as my eternal destination. The path I walk here on earth finally leads to that city. I didn't see every turn and fork on the footpath but I could always tell I was heading in the right direction. When we walk by faith, we must be able to see our ultimate goal. This will keep us from being distracted by things and roads along the way that move us in different directions or from just walking in circles. Journey through oppositionMany people have the idea that if something is from God, it will be easy. That's not the case. If it is more than possible from God, you will experience opposition. This may come from friends, family, or other well-meaning Christians. Not everyone in your life is healthy or motivated from the focus of faith. Think about it. Jesus, who was a model for our Christian life, experienced spiritual opposition from Satan in the desert, from the religious leaders of that day, and from the Roman empire that placed Him on the cross. Don't think that if there is anything from God that all you will get is a smooth cruise and kudos affirmation to your decision. Expect opposition. Riding the emotional roller coasterOnce again, many people believe that if it was God that they would not experience despair, fear, or other emotions that were considered negative. Look at Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. He is so confused as to what is before Him that He sweats drops of blood. He asked for the path to be changed but still walked forward in faith. In the course of my faith when I was waiting for the Lord to return me to ministry, there were many times I would be discouraged. There are many times I would be angry at people who wouldn't give one and divorce a man the chance to lead a church. However, I know God speaks. I knew it was going to work. I know I've heard from God. I walked forward all the same even in the midst of despair. Don't let your emotions and feelings today rob you of what God will give you tomorrow. That's why I respect the people who say God told me something one day and then when feelings go away, or they face opposition they throw it all away and say Well it's definitely not God. If it is God, then walk by faith! yes, you're probably discouraged, yes, you might see the opposition. But who gave you this? Mission, God or pizza?
