What people usually refer to is the shared app, though, the free online app offered by the organization of the same name. Colleges and universities join the Joint Application Organization as members and agree to accept a joint program from students who choose to use this free, online, one-stop program. Currently, more than 800 colleges and universities from 20 countries are members of the Joint Program. Each year, more than one million students, one-third of whom are first-generation college students, apply using a joint college program. The joint program started 40 years ago when 15 colleges and universities came together and imagined an innovative way to apply to college: a student could apply to a school and send a copy of the program to 14 other schools in the collective. The project, called joint application testing, grew into today's joint program, which was used by students around the world to simplify the college application process. Member organizations that accept the joint program are diverse. In 2015-16, students could apply to a diverse range of schools around the world, including colleges from 48 U.S. states, as well as Washington, D. C.; more than 250 colleges without application fees; 100+ public universities; 40+ international universities; 9 historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs); and more than 200 optional or flexible test schools. The organization continues to add more members and offer students limited to colleges with an ever-growing array of diverse colleges and universities that accept the same program. This site allows you to search by name of college, state, and explore schools by region. The joint program simplified the college application process for millions of students, but the organization also offers a variety of resources to students who use free, online software. The shared app system helps you stay on track by sending reminders and warnings about important dates and deadlines. You can access a variety of virtual consultants through the shared app site, and read up on important topics like why going to college, how to prepare, how to pay for college, and how to transfer. In addition to many students benefiting from the ease and support provided by the joint program, schools also benefit from an innovative approach to college application and admissions. The joint program simplified the admissions process for colleges and universities, and gives them insight and support to create a fair college program and admissions process driven by best practices. To become a member of the Joint Program, a college or university must be a nonprofit, undergraduate, accredited grant by a regional accreditation association (if in the United States) or a member of the International School Council (if outside the United States), and commit to pursuing equity and integrity in the college admissions process. We also include a sixth step: complete your joint application! 1. Creating an account is the first step to filling out the shared application of creating an account. You can create a shared app account at any time, so even if you're a few years left of high school, it might be helpful to create an account to familiarize yourself with an application that you're most likely using before you know it. It is not necessary to have completed certain courses, experiences or assignments before creating an account. In fact, you don't even need to know where you'd like to apply. Creating a shared App account merely requires some basic personal information, including your name, date of birth, address, phone number and email address. Be sure to save the email address and password you use to set up your account; No matter when you will be back to fill out a joint program and apply to colleges, you will need that important information. 2. Adding schools to your list is unlikely that you want to apply to all 800+ schools that accept the joint program, so the next step in filling the joint program is to add schools to your list. The shared app dashboard includes your list of my colleges. This is a convenient, easy-to-navigate page that applies what you need to do to each of the schools on your outline list. After creating an account, you can use the college search tab to browse and start adding schools to your list. You can search schools by name, state, district, application deadline, or distance from your home. These varied search options allow you to explore schools that may be a good fit for you, even if you don't know where you'd like to attend college yet. 3. The Shared App recommends having this information collected before sitting down to fill out the General App section. This will make things much easier and possibly faster for you. You will likely need the help of your parents/guardians and high school counselor as you fill out the general program. Recap: The Public Section requires a joint program: a copy of your high school transcripts lists your extra-program activities in and out of school exam scores and exam dates from your college entrance exams (SATs, ACTs, SAT subject tests) parents or forensic guardian information (educational background, job information, employer information, etc.) 5. Starting your joint application recommends that it is normal to feel nervous when starting your college applications. Perhaps the hardest part of this process actually starts. But when you create a joint application account, discover and study the requirements for schools you want to apply to, and collect the information needed for the public sector of the program, it's time to dive in. The shared app offers a mobile app that comes as a companion to the web platform that you use to fill the app. The app, Common App On Track, is available from the Apple App Store for iOS and Google Play for Android. 6. If this looks like you, then please share your story. Lessons from the obstacles they face can be fundamental to future success. Recount when you face a challenge, failure or failure. How did it affect you and what did you learn from the experience? Contemplate when you question or challenge a belief or idea. What made you think? What was the result? Describe the problem you've solved or the problem you want to solve. It can be an intellectual challenge, a research query, a moral dilemma - anything of personal importance, no matter the scale. Explain its importance to you and what steps you took to identify a solution. Talk about success, event, or realization that has sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others. Describing a topic, idea, or concept you find so fascinating that it makes you lose all the time path. Why capture you? Who or who do you turn to when you want to learn more? Share an article on any topic of your choice. It could be one you've already written, which responds to a different notification, or one of your design. On the shared app site, they share that: The most popular fast-paced article of the year requested from 2017-2018 was 'talk about success, event, or realization that sparks a period of personal growth'. ' (23.6%), followed by the subject of their choice option (22.5%), and 'some students have a history, identity, interest, or talent that is very meaningful.' (21.4%). This goes to show that there is a right or best quick article Choose the majority of students. The best topic of the article is the one that you connect to, promptly that inspires you to share a part of yourself or something important for you with college admissions staff at any school on your list. Time to carefully make quick choices that connect you with the best. Your joint program article should be honest, thoughtful, unique, and true to you, and your values, priorities, interests, and enthusiasm. Save your answers (somewhere else!) while we're discussing a joint application article, take a moment to commit to this practical tip that can save you hours of time and effort. The shared app allows you to type your article in a text box on your dashboard. This may seem like the easiest way to write your article, but if you take more than an hour to type, the page will log you in because of inactivity. In addition, the text box is not autosave, so if your internet goes out, you accidentally close the browser, or something else wacky/glitchy/unexpected/terrible happens, you'll lose your article. This is the best practice (recommended by your shared app folks) to write your article elsewhere (Google Documents, Microsoft Word, etc.) and copy/paste it into the common application text box when you've finished writing and editing. 8. Take a look at what you need as you are working on your shared application, sensitive to your needs. Are you tired of staring at the screen? Rereading the same article promptly over and over again? Take a break and return to your request when you are ready, with fresh eyes and renewed energy. Do you feel lost, confused or overwhelmed? Ask for help, ask your parents, guardian, teacher, counselor, joint application worker, or any other you trust. Remember, filling out a joint program, or any college program for that subject, is a difficult task. Applying and accepting rest, help, and support will make all the difference in both your experience and your application. 9. Checking and editing looking at your app with fresh eyes isn't just about taking a break for yourself, it's also about the integrity and accuracy of your app. Even the best writers need to edit, so don't count yourself above a few rounds of reviews and revisions. You can often catch a lot of mistakes yourself or areas that need improvement by going over your schedule yourself, but second (or third!) trusted eye pairs can also be useful in the process of revision and editing. Remember, this app is your opportunity to introduce yourself to the schools you'd like to attend. Detailed editing ensures that you are putting your best foot forward when you click Send in your shared application. 10. Be Yourself May Sound But it's vital to subscribe yourself as you fill out the program. On the one hand, it is important to be quite honest about your application. It may be tempting to add an activity to your profile, fudge grade, or lie about holding a job. However, it's a very high risk that your only chances of applying will hurt if you've been discovered (and there's a good chance you will). If arbitrators request suspect that you are unrealistic in your application, they may investigate your claims, or reject your application simply because of your suspicions. It's also important to share your story and your passion with confidence about yourself. Someone is reading your article and program material and this is your chance to share why you in particular would be a great fit for your school. If you're trying to write about yourself or be authentic in your joint application, this is a great time to ask a trusted consultant, coach, or friend about what they think of you and what elements of your personality, skills, and passion you can highlight in your application package. This search engine allows you to search by the U.S. state, schools outside the United States, public or private, accept transfer requests, and other criteria such as lone men, lone women, or shared educational institutions. Similarly, the Colleges Exploration section of the Shared Program Site offers you tools to explore schools by region, name, or state. It is possible that a school on your list may not accept a joint application. Many public colleges and universities do not accept the joint program. Private schools seem more likely to accept a joint program, with all eight Ivy League schools (Brown University, Columbia University, Cornell University, Dartmouth College, Harvard University, Princeton University, University of Pennsylvania, and Yale University) and other types of highly selective private schools (Stanford University, University of Chicago, California Institute of Technology, Johns University, Hopkins University, Vanderbilt University, and Rice University) accepting the Common Application. However, many students successfully fill out joint programs as well as applications to those individual schools that do not use participatory college admission requests. Look at it this way: Most of the information you collected for the shared program - as well as your articles, reflections, and test scores - can easily be reused in other applications, with few changes that fit each school's requirements.
